



You've got an extra day to check out Canada's capital. Here's what you do. by Laura byrne paquet

THE COMMON GREETING in every store, "hello-bonjour," tells only part of Ottawa's story. Sure, the capital reflects Canada's English-French heritage, but the city is increasingly multicultural. You're as likely to nosh on takeout shawarma-Ottawa is home to one of the country's largest Lebanese-Canadian communities—as tourtière (meat pie). The neo-Gothic buildings on Parliament Hill are the best-known landmarks, and the nearby Rideau Canal pathways are magnets for joggers and cyclists. But to truly take the city's temp, head west on the O-Train Confederation Line to gobble maple-bacon doughnuts at SuzyQ and see indie plays at the Great Canadian Theatre Company in Hintonburg.

Jabberwocky's clever cocktails include a BBees Knees mixed with beeswax-washed gin and spiced honey. At Zoe's, a blend of rye whiskey, single malt scotch and maple syrup called The Statesman arrives inside a tiny glass cabinet, wreathed in cedar smoke. In Gatineau, Québec, north across the Ottawa River, awardwinning sommelier Véronique Rivest presides over a diverse wine list at Soif. And Brew Donkey Tours runs bus day trips to craft breweries.

## **EAT**

If you're nursing a hangover, poutine—a mélange of fries, cheese curds and gravy—from **S&G Fries** & Burgers may be the cure. On the healthier side, the Mystical Bowl at Pure Kitchen brims with avocado and crispy lime tofu. Money no object? At 44-seat Atelier, two-time Canadian Culinary Championships winner Marc Lepine frequently revises the 12-course tasting menu.

## **GET OUTDOORS**

Work off your meal by hiking to the Carbide Willson Ruins in Gatineau Park, then relax in a hot tub among rocky outcrops at Nordik Spa-Nature. Or zip-line 120 feet above the Ottawa River when Interzip Rogers opens this summer. In winter, dodge crowds on the world's largest skating rink, the frozen Rideau Canal, by gliding under a stone bridge to Patterson Creek.

## **BE ARTSY**

In 2019, the National Arts Centre launched its Indigenous Theatre department—the world's first such national program. RBC Bluesfest (July 9 to 19, 2020) has grown beyond blues to become one of Canada's largest outdoor music festivals. At the National Gallery of Canada, don't miss North Shore, Lake Superior, Lawren Harris' ethereal 1926 painting.
